# John R. Carson 4th of July Road Race

## **Background on John**

John R. Carson, son of John and Linda Carson and brother of Laurie Carson, grew up in Chelmsford. As he matured he developed interest and skills in running, scouting, and church.

In his sophomore year at Chelmsford High School (CHS), his Spring Track Team completed a very successful season, and John was a strong performer. In addition to breaking the meet record at the statewide Red Auerbach Invitational in 1000 yd., he came within one second of the CHS mile record.

That fall, even though he was only a junior, he was chosen co-captain of the cross-country team. He was undefeated in Merrimack Valley Conference meets and placed 7<sup>th</sup> out of over 200 runners in the Manhattan Invitational.

Sadly this all came to an end during his junior year when, on December 30, 1987, he was hit by a train while on a practice run with his Winter Track Team.

In addition to running, John also excelled in scouting. As a member of Boy Scout Troop 74, he completed all the requirements for his Eagle Scout badge before he died. This prestigious award was presented posthumously to his parents in February 1988.

John was also an active member of Central Congregational Church in Chelmsford.

After his death, John's parents and sister sought to find ways to perpetuate his memory in a positive way. They established the John R. Carson Memorial Scholarship, which awards an annual scholarship to a CHS senior boy distance runner. More details are provided below. They also award a campership each spring to a boy in John's Boy Scout Troop 74 to cover the cost of one week at summer camp.

John's family and friends turned an overgrown vacant lot adjacent to Central Congregational Church into a beautiful park. Named the John R. Carson Memorial Park, it was dedicated in 1990. Included is a gazebo where John's sister Laurie was married. Members of the public enjoy the year-round beauty of the park, and it is a popular location for photos on special occasion as well as weddings.

In 1988 the Chelmsford School Committee named the track at Chelmsford High School in John's memory.

### **History of this race**

Since the 1970s, runners have taken up the challenge of racing down North Road from the Drum Hill area to Chelmsford Center before the 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade takes over the road. Early races saw a few hundred runners, but in the last few years the numbers have steadily risen to over 2,000 registered contestants. Spectators line and cheer along the entire route.

The Chelmsford Jaycees sponsored the 4<sup>th</sup> of July road race for several years prior to John's death. The following July 4<sup>th</sup> (1988) they dedicated the race to John's memory. Two years later, Sully's Ice Cream (managed by Race Director Bob Sullivan) and the Chelmsford Recreation Commission picked up sponsorship. This continued until 1997, when lead sponsorship was taken over by Sullivan Farms Ice Cream, which is owned by Bob and Maryann Sullivan. Bob continued as Race Director and has maintained that position ever since.

In 1990 and 1991 an additional race (called the John Carson Memorial Road Race) was held in late July. Both were co-sponsored by the Courthouse Racquetball and Fitness Club and the Chelmsford Jaycees. Included were a 5-mile run and a shorter (2 or 2 ½-mile) fun run. Dave Dunham won both 5-mile runs.

### The race today

The John R. Carson 4<sup>th</sup> of July Road Race is as much a family event as a racing challenge. Town spirit and family fun are marks of this race. "It's a fun, fun day," says Race Director Bob Sullivan, himself a runner. He has found that all ages take on the challenge, appreciate the crowd support, and come back for more the following year.

Prizes for the male and female winners are as follow:

- First place -- \$500
- Second Place -- \$300
- Third Place -- \$200
- Course record -- \$1,000

First, second and third place winners in all age divisions are mailed a Sullivan Farms ice cream gift certificate -- \$20, 15 and 10, respectively. In addition, all younger runners receive a ribbon upon competition of the race.

## John R. Carson Memorial Scholarship

Most of the proceeds from this race help to fund a scholarship that is awarded each year at CHS's Spring Sports Award Night. Criteria for selection of the recipient are as follows:

- Must be a CHS senior boy.
- Must be a distance runner (1/2 mile and longer).
- Must be a member of the CHS cross-country, winter track and/or spring track teams.
- Must have been accepted at an accredited college or university and plan to attend it.

The recipient is selected by a committee composed of running coaches and the athletic director based on the way that he exemplifies John's running skills, teamwork and leadership.

This year's recipient is Luca Bove. When Luca was a freshman, he was a back-of-the-pack runner who wasn't considered to have much potential. However, through the years he continued to stay motivated and worked hard to become a varsity runner. This dedication and leadership motivated others by showing that hard work pays off.

Luca had a great senior season, which was a huge part of the team's indoor success. He was voted captain of the cross country, indoor and outdoor track teams this year. He plans to attend UMass/Lowell this fall where he will run and major in Electrical Engineering.

• The Michael Perruccio Wrestling Foundation. Mike passed away at age 30 in March 2023 after a motorcycle accident in Phuket, Thailand. Living his dream and pursuing his passion for mixed martial arts, Michael was training Muay Thai in Thailand.

Growing up in Pelham, NH, Mike started wrestling at a young age. He attended Pelham High School where he was a member and captain of the wrestling team, becoming a three-time state champion and three-time New England qualifier. Following high school, Mike attended Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI) where he continued his wrestling career as a three-year captain and three-time all-regional placer. Upon graduation, he continued his involvement with the WPI wrestling program as a regular-season assistant coach followed by the head coach of the WPI wrestling club team.

Mike served as a true inspiration and mentor to those around him. Throughout his life, he motivated countless people, both on and off the mats, by modeling discipline, hard work, integrity, and dedication.

To continue his legacy and devotion to wrestling, Mike's family set up a long-term development foundation in his name to support, build, and maintain the New Hampshire wrestling community for years to come.

Nik was chosen to be a mentor at CHS, and he knew the underclassmen were looking up to him and it was his duty to be a good role model and a good role model he was.

The Nik Sperounis Memorial Scholarship is awarded to a deserving Chelmsford High School senior, who is a three-sport athlete and maintains a B or higher average.

• Jack Trottier Foundation. On January 16, 2013 Jack suffered a spinal cord injury while snowboarding. A burst fracture of his C6 vertebrae caused paralysis from the chest down. After emergency surgery at Boston Children's Hospital, Jack spent nine days in intensive care to stabilize the spine and autonomic functions. He then flew down to the Shepherd Center in Atlanta for 13 weeks of intense rehabilitation. Jack returned home and began his senior year at Tyngsboro High School that fall. After graduation, he enrolled at UMASS-Lowell to earn a degree in business — graduating in 2019.

Since his injury, Jack has graduated from college, relearned how to drive, completed the Baystate Marathon using a hand-cycle, continued coaching high school football, published a book, and started working selling adaptive vehicles. His family and community have supported him since the beginning. Now, he and his foundation assist those who navigate a similar experience by bringing well-rounded programs to them.
